The first Assembly of the Plenary Council of Australia meets this weekend.

Over the last two years the Listening and Dialogue phase was completed, and key subject areas emerged. From those came the <u>National Themes</u> for Discernment. The Australian Church was asked to consider them from a local and national perspective. The Council then developed its six <u>Agenda</u> items – Conversion, Prayer, Formation, Structures, Governance and Institutions.

During the past few months Parramatta Diocese invited responses from Deaneries and parishes to those Agenda items. The <u>responses</u> were distilled into an <u>Executive</u> Summary.

In hindsight, the Plenary Council's <u>Agenda</u> might appear to lack the richness, depth and breadth of the original Themes. Paul Collins, in an opinion piece in the SMH on 29 September, noted that "...the Agenda... doesn't reflect the concerns and questions expressed in the consultations, but replaces them with vague and frustratingly generalised concepts". That language doesn't encourage discussion of the practical questions the Church faces. In comparison, the responses by Parramatta Deaneries and parishes are rich, analytical and particular. They offer issues that we can easily grasp and act upon.

Covid coinciding with the Plenary may have been fortuitous – we are connecting with more people in ways not thought of before. We build community through apps, and Zoom (prayer groups, reflections, Masses, adult education...). We are doing this in parishes, Deaneries and Diocese.

St Finbars had to halt its discussions in June because of Covid, but since it looks like restrictions will be lifted early October, we could revisit the practical ideas and suggestions around the two themes we were concentrating on:

Building Community within our Parish Ongoing formation of Individual and Parish

In the end, to extract something concrete from the Plenary to the benefit of our parishes, we want to put into action things which connect to the Agenda, but which are implementable for us.

Using the Agenda items, I was asked what issues could be highlighted for our parish/Deanery?

GLENBROOK PARISH – ROADMAP OUT OF COVID-19

In line with the NSW Government's plan to progressively re-open the state once vaccine levels have reached satisfactory levels, our parish has also developed a provisional plan to resume weekend Masses for all parishioners at the normal times, once it is deemed safe to do so. According to the advice by Bishop Vincent, a satisfactory level is achieved at 80% of state-wide double dose vaccination. When NSW reaches 80% double vaccination (estimated to be 18 or 25 Oct), places of worship will be open to everyone, including partially and unvaccinated people.

The parish hopes to resume weekend Masses on the **weekend of 22/23 October**, provided the double vaccinated rate is over 80%.

Currently our 2773 postcode vaccination levels sit at over 90% of those over 16 years of age with at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine and between 70-79% who are double vaccinated (Source: https://www.nsw.gov.au/covid-19/find-the-facts-about-covid-19).

The re-opening can only occur if all parishioners are respectful of everyone else, and masks are worn, social distancing is observed, and you register your presence.

All parishioners are encouraged to get vaccinated to ensure the continuing good health of all in the parish, especially if you are part liturgical ministry, such as special ministers of the Holy Communion, readers, musicians, or altar ministers. If you have any concerns about getting vaccinated, please consult your medical practitioner.

To allow everyone to feel comfortable attending Mass, we plan to have all doors opened and all outside speakers turned on so that you can sit in additional places outside if that is your preference. We will arrange to bring Holy Communion to all sitting outside.

We intend to continue with the Mass live-streaming until the time when our church can <u>fully reopen</u>. However, this service depends on our team's ability to control the noise factor in the church that results from the coming and going of parishioners during the live-streamed Mass.

Parish groups can gather again in parish facilities once we have achieved 80% of double doses of vaccination.

It is important that all parishioners must comply COVID Safe measures:

85 adults can sit inside the church (1 per 4 sqm), without counting children under 12 years

Preferably, families ought to sit together, leaving at least one row in between.

Masks must be worn at all times indoors and all must use hand sanitizers at the entry to the church.

Signing upon arrival till places are filled.

Congregational singing is not permitted at this point of time.

Pastoral letter to all clergy in the Diocese of Parramatta on the reopening of churches for public worship

Dear brothers,

As you are all aware the result of the vaccination program across the State is going lead to a lessening of restrictions in a phased manner between 11 October and 1 December. The NSW Government have indicated that when 70% of the population has received their full vaccination that places of worship can reopen, but only for those who are fully vaccinated.

Discussion amongst the Bishops in the Province and more broadly across the country has led me to the conclusion that it would be counterproductive to reopen our places of worship only to the vaccinated. Whilst Pope Francis and other Church leaders have stressed the importance of being vaccinated for the common good of all, the Church also respects those who choose not to be vaccinated.

Therefore, I have determined that we should wait until the 80% threshold has been achieved before we reopen our Churches as this would then permit all Catholics to attend regardless of vaccination status. The projection is that this is likely sometime towards the end of October. The People of God have along with the rest of the community been deprived of many of the liberties and ability to participate in a range of activities that give meaning and purpose to their lives. It is to the core of our ministry that we resume our pastoral care of the people as soon as that is practicable.

Admission to both hospitals and aged care facilities to minister pastorally to patients and residents will require that clergy are vaccinated. As this ministry is at the heart of the Gospel, I would encourage all clergy if they have not already been vaccinated to arrange to do so as soon as possible.

Once a date has been finalised by the NSW Government as to when 80% fully vaccinated has been achieved an advice to reopen will come from the Chancery.

Conversion: The issue most widely discussed within and across all 28 dioceses was 'greater inclusion for all', which, for respondents, meant greater inclusion for persons of all sexual preferences and genders, for marginalized persons, refugees, migrants, disabled persons, and poor persons, as well as a rethinking of church attitudes to relationships (e.g. same-sex) and moral issues (e.g. contraception, premarital sex, divorce). The Diocese is working on an Inclusion statement for those who are felt to be on the margins of our church community (LGBQTI+, divorced...). Contribute to those discussions.

Prayer: What options are there for spiritual direction? Small group prayer experiences, praying with others in smaller groups is important, encouraging and energising us for mission.

Formation: Provide opportunities for the faithful and the clergy to have ongoing faith formation at the local level. Fr Joe's Theology sessions are available Deanery-wide.

We all need to face up to and openly discuss the problem of Clericalism, both clergy and laity. It is elitist and very damaging to the whole Church community. And the common experience of "walking together" as a synodal Church is also presented as a remedy for clericalism.

Structures: Family centred, dynamic and experiential Sacramental preparation on a Deanery-wide basis, to incorporate the strengths/talents of various parishes. Small groups for both parents and families are the best way to model community during Sacramental preparation. These are unique opportunities to build active and enthusiastic disciples of Jesus not just with the children but also with their parents.

Proceed with the *Gathering of Talents* workshop in early 2022.

Governance: Synodality is an attitude of mind and heart, with the conviction that the spirit is given to each member of the Church, so that each has the gift and responsibility to contribute to the lived understanding of faith and to share the gospel. The key enabling synodal institution, the pastoral council, is disappointing and patchy in Australia. Few dioceses have diocesan pastoral councils. And parish councils to have an authority, with a co-responsibility for a parish; they should not be merely advisory. We are fortunate in our diocese to have the three levels of pastoral councils that strive to work together.

Synodality is hard work. It is also a work in progress and far from a finished product, yet the future of the church in Australia depends upon its successful adoption. The Pope said "a synodal Church is one which listens, which realises that listening is more than simple hearing. It is a mutual listening in which everyone has something to learn". In recognising that "we are all equal through the baptism in Christ" there will be a flow on in our communities.

Institutions: Have schools adopt a cause in the local community and enable students to have the opportunity to devise ways, means and actions to be Christ-like. Commit to shared programs between school and parish that effectively evangelise the whole family.

"Give us ears to listen humbly to each other, and a discerning heart to hear what you are saying" (Pope Francis). "The only task worthy of our efforts is to construct the future" (Teilhard de Chardin). The hope is that this historic once-in-a-generation Plenary Council may be an expression of such efforts.
